## WHAT IS AN ADU?

- A small residence that shares a single-family lot with a larger, primary dwelling
- An independent living space, self-contained, with its own kitchen or kitchenette, bathroom and sleeping area
- Can be located within, attached to or detached from the main residence
- Can be converted from an existing structure (such as a garage) or built anew
- Can be found in cities, suburbs and rural areas, yet are often invisible from view because they're positioned behind or are indistinct from the main house





# BENEFITS

- Provide rental income to homeowners and an affordable way for renters to live in single-family neighborhoods
- Enable family members to live on the same property while having their own living spaces or provide housing for a hired caregiver
- Unlike tiny houses, ADUs are compact but not teeny, so they're a more practical option for individuals, couples and families seeking small, affordable housing
- For homeowners looking to downsize, an ADU can be a more appealing option than moving into an apartment or, if older, an age-restricted community
- ADUs can help older residents remain in their community and "age in place" or provide supplemental income via short-term rentals



### DRAWBACKS

- Property taxes may increase
- Possible issues with renters and maintenance
- May create or exacerbate parking problems
- Diminishes privacy
- Prone to NIMBYism

Most neighborhoods...don't allow a range of home options that would work better for adults living alone, young couples starting out, older adults who want to downsize, single parents and their children, or adults living together in shared housing.

- <u>Affordability/homelessness</u>. Interest-free loans to people willing to build ADUs to help affordably house those otherwise closed out of neighborhoods is one consideration in the Oregon governor's race.

The Duplex Next Door is Normal. The One Not Built is a Threat. The current status quo—monocultural neighborhoods of orderly rows of homes, all at about the same price point, which don't evolve into anything else over time—is not some state of nature or neutral condition. It's actually a pretty recent and radical experiment, in the grand scheme of things.
